

Reporting Illegal Dumping and Illicit Discharges Did you know... Stormwater is the excess rainfall that isn't absorbed into the ground and runs off to nearby lakes, canals, the Intracoastal Waterway, and the ocean. Along the way, it can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt and other pollutants and carry them into our surface waters. Much of this stormwater receives little or NO treatment! That means that what goes in, comes out, in to the waters we use for fishing, boating and swimming. Intentional dumping and discharging into stormwater systems, as well as accidental spills that could enter the system should be reported immediately so remedial action can be taken by the proper response team. Why it Matters Debris can be harmful to wildlife Nutrients (from leaves, grass, fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides) can lead to fish kills and excessive amounts of algae in the water • Bacteria (from pet waste and dead animals) can produce health concerns Sediment can reduce the system's ability to handle potential flooding and adversely affect
