Vice-Mayor Rumsey had three votes and Commissioner Stevens had two votes. Kendall Rumsey will continue as Vice-Mayor.

PROCLAMATION:

Todd Dry

Mayor DuBois read and presented Todd Dry with a Proclamation and thanked him for his service on the Planning and Zoning Board.

PUBLIC AND OTHER COMMENTS:

Mayor DuBois reminded residents that if they wanted to discuss an agenda item, they needed to indicate that on their pink comment card. Mayor DuBois also reminded Commissioners that if anyone wanted to respond to the residents' comments/concerns, that it should be done during the Commissioner's Comments section of the agenda.

1. Kathleen Lampkin, 618 Date Palm Drive—indicated that the camera at the ball field may be broken. She stated that she was having issues with soccer balls hitting and coming over her fence and she had to repair her fence as a result of it. She stated that seed pods are falling over her fence into her backyard.

Mayor DuBois asked Ms. Lampkin to give her phone number on her comment card so the Town can get back to her. He asked the Town Manager to be in the touch with Ms. Lampkin.

Town Manager Davis was asked if the cameras were even working at the ball field and she responded that they weren't because of a lightning storm. She explained that they have been ordered but that she wasn't sure when.

Mayor DuBois thanked Ms. Lampkin for bringing this issue to their attention.

- 2. Rick Goodsell, 410 9th St.— he stated he wanted to see who the Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians were. He also stated that he is with the Community Watch and that the Community Watch meeting on the sign out front was supposed to have been changed to 6:00 pm. This wasn't done. He spoke about his frustration with how Commissioner Longtin and Hockman have been treated. They were looking into things that people can't look into themselves. CRA is number one and meters are number two. He mentioned that he hopes with the new Commission, that Commissioner Longtin and Hockman will be treated better. He indicated that he has issues regarding the CRA and how residents are told new businesses are coming and never come forth. CRA is taking care of those blocks but if should take care of the whole CRA. He hopes that everyone gets along on the Commission and that things get done.
- 3. Jim Lloyd, 220 Lake Shore Dr. stated that in the past couple of months he has learned that this Town is full of nice folks. He thanked all those that welcomed him into their homes. He stated that he realized that this Town's government needs some improvement. He stated the actions of those who run things, only occasionally coincide with State and local law. He stated that he is happy to be part of Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians intend to keep an eye on Town Hall. He explained that www.Thestreetwhereyoulive.wordpress.com is a blog where anyone can go to read from citizens talking about the Town and 1-877-500-6560 for more information on the organization.

4. Susan Lloyd, 220 Lake Shore Dr. - see "exhibit A"

Mayor DuBois asked the Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians group to refer to itself by their full name. He also asked Ms. Lloyd if she would mind entering her document (Exhibit A) into the record. Ms. Lloyd agreed.

Motion: Vice-Mayor Rumsey made a motion to receive and file the document; Commissioner Stevens made a second.

Attorney Baird explained that the Public Comment Cards were kept on file as well.

5. John Mede, 220 Lake Shore Dr. - Congratulated the new Mayor and Commissioner Stevens. He explained that what started out as an email joke to friends and neighbors asking them to become members of Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians started to form into what it is now an awareness for both sides. He stated that the majority of people do have opinions on political matters, but fail to voice or act upon them and consequently end up accepting political decisions made on their behalf by elected officials. He stated that this was true from the local, County, State, and Federal levels. He explained that on the news there is always some type of news regarding how government has acted in such a way that people ask themselves "how did that happen". He explained that what Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians. intends to do is bring awareness and understanding to both sides of the political process, of those that represent and those that are being represented. Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians is to be a form of informational exchange asking how decisions are made and what has gone into the thought process of the action being taken by the elected representatives. Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians will be a place where citizens may go and ask questions regarding issues that affect their day to day lives and what determines the course of action that is being taken by their representatives and how the representatives arrive at their decisions. He explained that the political accountability needs to be revised. He stated that the basic components are the elected officials and their constituents and how a disconnect occurs. He explained how the pendulum swings both ways, which is what caused Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians to rise. He stated that he hoped the humor in the name will continue in an effort to keep the attention on matters that indeed impact lives. He explained the Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians is an open exchange of information. He stated that what it is not is bashing organization or group of activities who are trouble makers. He stated that respect is a requirement, which also swings both ways so that a member of Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians is bound to be respectful of both process and players regardless of a representative's position. He quoted Vice-Mayor Rumsey's saying of "We can disagree without being disagreeable". Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians would like to see that moving forward and although some may be offended by the acronym, they will become aware of the intent, which is to raise citizen awareness and input and have the political representatives aware of their

positions prior to making decisions. Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians intent is to make transparent government exactly what it says it is, because now that is not the case.

6. Priscilla Chase, 810 2nd Ct. – Congratulated Mayor DuBois and Commissioner Stevens. She expressed her concerns about vacant and abandoned homes. She gave the Commission a copy of a newspaper article (see exhibit "B") regarding the topic. She spoke about a house around her property that is abandoned and is an "eye sore" and made reference to other streets that need attention. She asked the Commission to consider more attention to this topic.

Mayor DuBois explained that there was an Ordinance that did not pass concerning registered homes and would like to see this come up again. Commissioner Longtin asked if they could bring it up now. Attorney Baird suggested that it be brought up under Commissioner's Comments.

7. Al Jacquet, West Palm Beach – spoke to the Commission and citizens on behalf of State Representative Mack Bernard. He congratulated the new Mayor and Commissioner. Mr. Jacquet brought a legislative update handout for the citizens to review, which is attached as Exhibit "C".

Commissioner Hockman stated that on item number 8 on the Consent Agenda, he will have to abstain from voting on this because of past and future work of contracts.

Commissioner Longtin wanted to know what obligations or responsibilities this agreement holds us to if it is passed.

Public Works Director David Hunt explained the requirements of this agreement regarding pollution discharge. He explained that the Town has no other responsibilities other than to follow their interpretation of the permit and to pay our annual dues of approximately \$4,000.

CRA Project Manager Richard Pittman discussed item number 10 on the Consent Agenda the "Eyes on Park Avenue" bid. He gave a brief overview of what was required for these cameras as well as their intent.

Commissioner Hockman asked if the Town has upgraded its electrical at this point.

Project Manager Pittman responded "no" and explained that there is a transformer at several locations and that the conversion for providing the electrical service is part of the contract, except for behind the Post Office.

Commissioner Hockman asked approximately how much money will the Town have to spend on this project.

Project Manager Pittman explained that Casper Electric gave a quote of \$1, 200.00 to upgrade the alley, but there will also be a monthly Internet service cost.

Town Manager Davis explained that the Information Technology Director was out of Town and that she would be happy to have him get an actual monthly cost and she will provide this information to the Commission.

Vice-Mayor Rumsey asked to get an actual monthly cost for connection to the Internet to see exactly what we are looking at.

Town Manager Davis mentioned she would be happy to get that number for them, but reminded them that this is a time-sensitive matter. She asked that Virginia Martin, Grants Writer, speak to the Commission.

Grants Writer Martin confirmed the time-sensitive nature of this item and that it had been previously postponed until a full Commission was in place. She explained that if the national debt ceiling not raised, all funds not committed will be returned to the Federal government.

Town Manager Davis affirmed this.

Mayor DuBois asked if the contract is contingent on the grant money and clarified that the Town will not enter into the contract without the grant. He asked about the service agreement in view of the warranty period.

Project Manager Pittman informed the Commission that there is a one-year warranty. He explained that the extended warranty will take the Town over budget. He explained that after the one-year warranty time is up, the Town is responsible.

Commissioner Stevens asked what the poles will withstand in terms of wind load.

Project Manager Pittman stated the transmitter could withstand 118 mph and the cameras could withstand 110 mph. The fiberglass poles are 10 years old could withstand 140 mph.

Commissioner Longtin asked who would be monitoring the cameras, and asked if he will be the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office (PBSO).

Project Manager Pittman explained that no one will be sitting 24 hours a day looking at them. He explained that they are available for PBSO to look at on the Internet when they need to and they will have the capabilities to look at a "real time" view on their laptops.

Commissioner Longtin asked after the initial year who warranties them. She asked why not cameras in other areas, for example the ball fields.

Project Manager Pittman assured Commissioner Longtin that once the contract is over, the Town would be responsible for the cameras.

Commissioner Longtin also asked why we had to put ten cameras on three blocks. She mentioned that we should put cameras in the ball fields and industrial park because we have issues there.

Town Manager Davis explained that we already have cameras at the ball fields from the last grant.

Commissioner Longtin asked if those were functional.

Town Manager Davis explained that the cameras had been hit by lightening and were being fixed.

Commissioner Longtin asked if the cameras were being replaced at our cost.

Town Manager Davis explained that it was.

Commissioner Longtin asked if we could just take the cameras from this grant and put them at the ball fields to replace the ones that were not working.

Town Manager Davis explained that this grant was already written and could not be changed to relocate the cameras. She explained that it would not fit into the scope of work for the grant.

Commissioner Longtin asked how many cameras were at the ball fields.

Town Manager Davis was not sure and mentioned that she would get back to the Commission with that answer.

Grant Writer Martin mentioned there are eight cameras at the ball fields.

Commissioner Longtin explained that she will be voting "no" on this.

Mayor DuBois asked her to hold off on that decision because he wanted to go for a motion, and then discuss that for debate, if there is a motion and a second. Mayor DuBois then asked for a motion and a second so they could, in fact, discuss the issue.

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Stevens to approve item number 10 on the Consent Agenda conditioned on the cost of Comcast being no more than \$300.00 yearly; Vice-Mayor Rumsey made the second.

Vice-Mayor Rumsey questioned Commissioner Stevens if it was \$300.00 monthly or annually.

Commissioner Stevens answered "yearly."

Vice-Mayor Rumsey mentioned that he was confused about the grant and if we actually had the money or not. He stated that he knows it is a time-sensitive issue.

Grant Writer Martin explained that we already had the money but we have to spend the money or we may have to send it back to Washington, and that all funds not expended could be recalled.

Mayor DuBois tried to recap the situation by saying we have a free system being installed at basically very little cost for the Town with added security and confidence to the CRA and Park Avenue for as long as it will survive. He explained that whatever time we get out of it and whatever maintenance we can put into it, we will be ahead. He said he saw it as a win if the system was approved.

Commissioner Longtin explained that she feels the need to be fiscally responsible no matter if it is Lake Park taxpayer money, County taxpayer money, State taxpayer money, or Federal taxpayer money. She feels that having ten cameras on three city blocks is too much. She reiterated that she will be voting "no" on this subject.

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Stevens to approve item number 10 on the Consent Agenda conditional of the cost of Comcast being no more than \$300.00 yearly; Vice-Mayor Rumsey made the second.

ORDINANCE ON FIRST READING: Ordinance No. 04-2011 K-Mart Rezoning

PUBLIC HEARING: Quasi-Judicial Hearing

Ex parte Communication:

Mayor DuBois: stated that he had spoken to Nadia DiTommaso about this project. He has had no other communications.

Commissioner Hockman: stated that he spoke with Mr. Gentile a month ago. He explained that he was going to abstain from voting due to past and possible future working contracts.

Commissioner Stevens: stated that he was on the Planning and Zoning Board when this matter first came up. He declared no ex parte communication.

Commissioner Longtin: stated that she spoke Mr. Gentile regarding the project.

Vice-Mayor Rumsey: none.

Community Development Director Nadia DiTommaso explained the request for rezoning. She reassured the Commission that there is no development being proposed at this time. Gentile, Holloway, O'Mahoney and Associates, Inc. are working on behalf of the owner of the property. She explained that they want to change the zoning from a Commercial-1 (C-1) property to a PUD (Planned Unit Development) and she explained the Code regarding a PUD. She stated that by doing this, it will subdivide the property and it would presumably facilitate the likelihood of future redevelopment, which would benefit the Town with possible increased tax base. She explained that it would also bring the property into legal conforming use and that the Town will still have full control over the site. She explained that the Planning and Zoning Board reviewed this twice (April 4, 2011 and May 2, 2011). The Planning and Zoning Board recommended approval to the Town Commission with the conditions to add some additional plantings along the south and west property lines. She stated that staff is recommending that the Town Commission grant the approval of the change in zoning and that the applicant was here to give a presentation as well.

Dodi Glas, representative for Gentile, Holloway, O'Mahoney and Associates, Inc., gave a Powerpoint presentation (see exhibit "D") to the Commission. She gave more history on the PUD's and spoke about how the property would be broken into three separate parcels. She stated that now they have to abide by standards to two different Codes (Town and the Northlake Boulevard Overlay Zone [NBOZ]). She explained that the Town Code is older than NBOZ and these Codes differ in three different areas – landscaping, parking, and open space. She explained on slide 14, the parking difference with each of the Codes which impacted the landscaping as well. She explained that on slide 18 the buffer points and their variations, and that she would be happy to answer any other question the Commission may have.

Attorney Baird stated that the witnesses were not sworn in and proceeded to swear them in.

Commissioner Hockman reiterated that he could participate pursuant to the new County Ethics Law effective June 1, 2011 concerning conflicts of interest.

Vice-Mayor Rumsey apologized to the applicant for not being at the previous meeting and forcing them to have to come back a second time. He asked about splitting the property into three owners and who would be the ultimate decision maker when it came to landscaping.

Dodi Glas explained that unity of control designates the entity in charge.

Vice-Mayor Rumsey asked if another business came in and wanted to purchase their portion of the property would this apply to them as well.

Dodi Glas explained that the plat dictates the subdivision and that no division can occur until the Commission reviews it and the documents are in place.

Commissioner Stevens thanked the applicant on the landscaping improvements and also wanted to know if there were any downsides to the Town if they approved the PUD.

Dodi Glas explained it would only be a downside if the Commission decided they didn't like the new design. She stated that sometimes a PUD is seen as a way of getting around the Code, but that the PUD standard is higher because there are design elements that have to be met rather than just Code.

Commissioner Longtin stated that, in her opinion "this site is one of the ugliest sites in Town". She stated that this site is a prime location being at the entrance of Town, and that this is where the landscaping should be required and brought up to Code.

Mayor DuBois explained to Commissioner Longtin that this portion of the meeting is for her to ask questions of the applicant.

Commissioner Longtin asked the applicant why they couldn't get rid of the wheel stops and put in landscaping islands.

Dodi Glas explained that the parking stops were standard requirements at the time of installation and that today it meets the standard and at this time, they do not want to redesign the parking lot. She explained that they could come back at a later time to request the redesign of the lot.

Commissioner Longtin commented that the Commission could ask, in lieu of approval, to "green up" the space. She expressed concern with the process. She indicated that more would need to be done on the parking lot.

Public Comment Open:

Brent Headberg, 220 Lake Shore Dr. – questioned the process for this agenda item and asked why this hearing was not publicized if this is an actual quasi-judicial hearing. He stated that he wants to see the notice that went out and the advertisement that went in the newspaper.

Town Manager Davis said she would be happy to provide the advertisement.

Mayor DuBois responded that this is a first reading and that the Ordinance will come back on second reading for additional discussion at that time.

Mr. Headberg commended Gentile, Holloway, O'Mahoney and Associates, Inc. for their plans and stated they are very well done. He explained that he is in support of this project and stating that he just wants clarification on the process of this hearing. He stated that he will formally request the information, if needed. He said we need to add as much as we can to enhance the landscape, etc. He is "all for it".

Mayor DuBois recommended that if he requests information in the future that he provide his contact information.

Mr. Headberg said he will send this information by email.

Public Comments Closed

There were no comments from Commissioner Hockman and Vice-Mayor Rumsey

Commissioner Longtin expressed concern that she doesn't see any agendas or minutes from the Planning and Zoning Board on the Town's website. She explained that a gentleman came to one of the Planning and Zoning meetings to speak, but is not sure of his concerns. She wasn't sure if he was contacted. She stated she thought we had to send out notices to surrounding property owners and wasn't sure if that had been done. She felt we should ask for more landscaping and had concerns with drainage. She explained that she hasn't seen any issues lately, but it is still a concern. She would like to see what the Planning and Zoning Board had to say about this issue in writing. She wasn't sure if surrounding property owners were notified and would like to see landscaping improved. She explained that she will be voting "no" on this issue.

Mayor DuBois suggested that she should not tell her vote because it prejudices other's votes. He explained that there will be a motion and a second and once that is done there will be time for debate and she can discuss that then.

Attorney Baird advised the Mayor that it is perfectly permissible to discuss how they may vote or suggest how they may vote if things are done.

Mayor DuBois explained about what he remembered from being a member of the Planning and Zoning Board when Chick-Fil-A came up. He stated that he missed the

improvement to K-Mart in general but recalled some really good discussion on this project. He recalled that there was not much that could be done on this site because of the non-conforming issues and lack of set-back. He recalled that the Planning and Zoning Chairman did everything that he could to improve landscaping. COMMENTS BY COMMISSION, TOWN MANAGER, TOWN ATTORNEY

Commissioner Hockman explained that he met with the Town Manager, the Finance Director, and Marina Director concerning the "Majestic Princess" and its seizure. He expressed his disappointment and stated for the record, "The Town has never sent an email, a notice, or anything in regard to the payment that was made was unsatisfactory." He hopes that from now on staff will now put things of this nature in letter form and not just hearsay. He stated that a lot of people have been asking what was going on about it. The Majestic Princess did get behind in what they owed the Town and were making payments. He explained that word got out about them doing a contract with West Palm and people 'jumped the gun" and thought the owner was going to "jump ship" and not pay the Town what they owed. He explained that they were making payments by the

agreement. He was told that the Town never made an email or any other notification that further action would be taken. He stated that he doesn't feel that this is a way to conduct business with our businesses in Town.

He asked the Town Manager if she would let him know by the next Commission meeting what the status was on the metal building at 115 U.S. Highway 1. He stated that he knew the first contractor backed out and the second, he is assuming, backed out. He thought this because the building is still standing and nothing has been done on it.

He stated that there have been a lot of rumors going on around Town. He said the first rumor is that on July 3, 2011, he was at the Marina and saw the parking lot was full. He noticed five boats backing up. He asked them why they were backing up and they responded that the Marina was full and there was no place to park. He stated that he noticed that the lot that we paid \$2.4 million for was empty and locked. He said that he went down and asked the dock attendant why we were not parking in there. The dock attendant replied that there was no key and he didn't know who had it. He stated that he made arrangements for the boats to park at Winn Dixie and went home to email the Town Manager as to why we are not utilizing the lot. He stated the Town Manager replied that "we can't use the lot because we need funds to open up the north fence and install a sliding gate." He mentioned, for the record, "Per the minutes in the August 4th meeting and again in October, the Town Manager stated that all was needed was to paint the stripes and the Town staff could do that and wouldn't cost very much." He expressed concern that costs seem to be climbing and he sent the Town Manager another email asking why we need the fence and that it should be removed. He stated the Town Manager replied that it was for security reasons. He stated that recently the security company had changed the hours and he is not sure who is watching the un-gated part of the Marina between the time when the staff leave at 5:00 p.m. or 5:30 p.m. and the security company gets there at 10:00 p.m. or 11:00 p.m. He explained that all this led to an email he received on Thursday that made him very disappointed. He explains that in this email he was being accused of threatening employees. He explained that the email explained that he was down at the dock threatening and demanding that the attendant open up the gate or else he wouldn't have a job on Tuesday. He stated that he wouldn't have done that because he was already told that the attendant didn't have a key, so why would he demand that it be opened. He mentioned that there are a lot of accusations going around about him that are not his personality. He stated that because of the lies and accusations, he is going to step down as the Library Board's liaison. He doesn't want to see any other charges or accusations against him. He is very disappointed with how things are going.

Vice-Mayor Rumsey welcomed Mayor DuBois and Commissioner Stevens to the dais and stated that he looks forward to working with both of them. He hopes that the Commission will be doing a proclamation for former Commissioner Osterman for her service to the Town. Mayor DuBois wanted to know if there was consensus of the Commissioners for doing that proclamation.

Commissioner Longtin explained that she did not want to vote for it because Ms. Osterman moved away in October and should not have collected the money she received nor made the votes she voted on. She believes that Ms. Osterman should have stepped

down when she moved away and believes Ms. Osterman owes the Town approximately \$5,000.00. She pointed out that Ms. Osterman never apologized for her actions and doesn't feel that they should reward her. She stated that she does wish Ms. Osterman and her family a wonderful life and states that she will be voting no.

Vice-Mayor Rumsey explained that he had gone to breakfast with Mr. Mede of the Citizens Requiring Accountability from Politicians organization. He explained that he knows there are some businesses in the community that will step up and will help us make it happen. He stated that there isn't much that this Town can't do when they get together. He looks forward to everyone working together and contributing to bring this back the last weekend of June.

Commissioner Stevens stated he was in support of bringing the fireworks back. Going door-to-door this is what he heard. He stated that fireworks and parking meters were the big issues when he was running for office. He stated that as far as the fireworks are concerned, the combination of community support and support of big business it is feasible without having to use Town funds.

He stated that on the issue of parking meters, he "knows it does generate significant revenue for the Town." He would like to see the Town explore the decal issue and suggested using a system similar to Lake Worth's system for their beaches. He realizes that there may be funding restraints, but he would like us to look into it.

He explained that it was a pleasure serving on his first Commission meeting and looks forward to working together with everyone to address the issues of Lake Park. He was very happy to see the turnout at the meeting and hopes everyone continues to attend the meetings, continues to contact us, and truly makes us accountable to the residents who voted us in.

Commissioner Longtin was concerned that the Planning and Zoning minutes and agendas were not located on the web site.

She congratulated Mayor DuBois and Commissioner Stevens and welcomed them to the Commission.

She questioned Commissioner Stevens regarding the comment he made about the parking meters making money. She suggested that he confirm the figures he has been given.

Commissioner Stevens clarified his statement by saying that the meters were not money makers, but a "source of revenue."

Commissioner Longtin wanted to point out that expenses exceeded the revenue on the meters.

Commissioner Longtin requested that the Town Manager give an update every meeting or at least once a month on the restaurants on Park Avenue. She stated that Casper's is open for business and is a lovely little restaurant.

Commissioner Longtin asked about the new Deputy Town Clerk and asked for her name.

Mayor DuBois informed the Commission that her name was Kelly Avery.

Commissioner Longtin congratulated and welcomed Kelly and stated that she was in awe of the Town Clerk's Office.

She mentioned that Palm Beach County has excellent hurricane information on their website (www.pbc.com). She stressed that special need residents need to pre-register with the County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at 1-561-712-6400. Pets need to be pre-registered with Animal Control as well. She spoke of a past hurricane issue as an example of the need to register. She stressed getting a plan in order and if anyone knows of a neighbor who has special needs to remind or help them to register.

Commissioner Longtin brought up the issue of the bank Ordinance. She explained that she wanted to vote on this before, but felt it should be done in a lawful manner and felt it was not done that way initially. She asked the Mayor to consider putting it back on the agenda.



Legislative Update State Representative Mack Bernard District 84

Thank you for the honor of serving you in the Florida House of Representatives. As always, I appreciate your vote of confidence.

Without a doubt, it's good to be back in House District 84 after a challenging 2011 legislative session. Each day of the nine-week session, I was reminded that Floridians remain worried about the economy and that our focus must be on creating jobs and improving livelihoods.

I proudly sponsored 13 bills this legislative session. Eight of those bills passed the House and four passed the Senate, as well. As of this newsletter, three of the bills have been signed into law by the Governor. They include legislation that increases penalties for domestic violence offenders, prohibits Florida from doing business with companies in Iran and the Sudan, and provides additional consumer protections for insurance customers. Unfortunately, there also was some backsliding of progress on key issues and many decisions were made without my support.

At the center of controversy was the debate over how to craft a new annual state spending plan. Just as many households are making ends meet with reduced revenue, the State of Florida faced a stiff challenge creating a balanced budget without the federal stimulus dollars that helped us get by in recent years.

I hope you find this legislative update to be a useful source of information on the 2011 session. BUDGET

The state budget, approved without my support in the final hours of the session, provides crucial funding for important projects; but it fails, in my opinion, to meet the overall needs of Floridians.

Arguably, not a single new job was created as a result of this budget, yet nearly 5,000 positions are eliminated. And though some contend it was balanced without raising taxes, the spending plan relies upon savings from a salary reduction, or what I call a personal income tax, of 3 percent on teachers, firefighters, police officers and hundreds of thousands of other participants in the Florida Retirement System.

In my opinion, this nearly \$70-billion spending plan is balanced on lopsided priorities. It appears to me that it allows multi-state and multi-national corporations to pay less than their fair share. And yet, it cuts spending on everything from public schools to affordable housing and environmental protection.

Deep cuts to public schools means funding to educate Florida's children will be reduced by \$1.35 billion. Per-student funding declines by a whopping \$542 to \$6,267 per student, or what amounts to an 8-percent cut. This produces the lowest per-student funding in Florida since the Fiscal Year 2005-06 state budget.

The budget raids millions of dollars from state trust funds intended to pay for priorities such as road construction, environmental land purchases, affordable housing, and fighting fraud. It also freezes spending for Florida Forever, the state's land-buying program, and reduces spending for Everglades restoration.

I fear the budget will cause real pain, and potentially threaten the health, safety and well-being of many Floridians. For instance, the budget slashes Medicaid reimbursement rates for hospitals and nursing homes, health departments, and non-emergency transportation. It also reduces spending on the Healthy Start program for women and infants.

PUBLIC SAFETY

I believe protecting the safety and security of the public is the fundamental role of government. Floridians deserve a justice system that guarantees due process, a corrections system that provides secure prisons, and law enforcement that protects and serves all Floridians.

In this tight budget year, the Legislature focused on funding the core functions of the courts, prisons, and law enforcement. The good news is, Florida didn't have to resort to the early release of dangerous criminals into our neighborhoods and communities. The bad news is, despite my opposition, the Florida Legislature voted to close the Glades Correctional Facility, eliminating several hundred jobs.

On a brighter note, Florida finally took action on the prescription drug abuse epidemic that has plagued our state for many years. In fact, more than seven people a day are dying from prescription drug abuse in Florida, and the state's current polices have been unable to

adequately address this egregious problem. In concert with Governor Scott and Attorney General Bondi, the House worked to build consensus around an aggressive and all-inclusive solution that tackles this crisis in Florida from all angles.

This bipartisan legislation fights the prescription drug epidemic on multiple levels, but it most importantly stops the problem at the source. By prohibiting doctors from dispensing medically unbelievable amounts of the most dangerous drugs, the epidemic of prescription drug abuse in Florida can be quickly and effectively put to an end. This legislation also gives law enforcement the support and tools necessary to combat the illicit distribution of controlled substances.

I believe the legislation passed this session, although not perfect, protects our most vulnerable, guards our neighborhoods from the scourge of harmful drugs, and preserves the fundamental rights we enjoy as Americans.



HEALTH CARE

In spite of the difficult budget challenges facing Florida, the Florida House remained committed to providing vital health care services to Floridians to the greatest extent financially possible. This year, the Legislature increased health care spending by 5.03% to provide quality health care for the neediest Floridians.

For individuals in Florida's Medicaid program, this session's reforms are bringing more accountability to the system, cracking down on fraud, and improving patient care by moving to a statewide managed care program. This move will ensure costs are controlled while delivering better and more stable services to Floridians who depend on Medicaid for their health care needs.

The Legislature restored full funding to important programs such as the Meds AD and the Medically Needy program, impacting approximately 42,115 beneficiaries in the Meds AD program and 46,096 beneficiaries in the Medically Needy program.

The Legislature also stepped up for our seniors in need of care. No one wants to stay in a nursing home if they can avoid it, and the quality of life for our seniors is higher if they can receive care at home or in their community. To address this, the legislature voted to increase the number of nursing home diversion slots, which will now allow nearly 19,000 of Florida's frailest elders who would otherwise qualify for Medicaid nursing home placement to receive necessary services in their homes or stay in their communities.

The Legislature also realized the strain that recent budget reductions had placed on Florida's developmentally disabled individuals and their families. We worked hard to protect services for Florida's developmentally disabled citizens to help maintain their quality of life and to make sure that our most vulnerable will continue receiving the care they need.



EDUCATION


I believe Florida's economic recovery will not be complete until we establish a world-class education system for students and educators. But that goal will become harder to meet, in my opinion, under this year's state budget and certain bills that passed the Legislature.

Most glaringly, this Legislature significantly cut education funding, authorizing a disappointing 8-percent reduction in per-student funding at public schools.

Raising standards, demanding accountability and offering innovative opportunities are widely supported approaches toward attaining higher student success. But I have found in Tallahassee that often legitimate debates

on education reform have become political in tone. This year, I opposed the creation of a complex new teacher evaluation plan that many educators have said will be detrimental to teaching in Florida. The strategy requires all new teachers in Florida, starting July I, to be evaluated on their effectiveness according to yet-developed measurements that will be based partially on students' FCAT scores.

Legislation also passed that is designed to relax enforcement of the 2002 amendment regarding class sizes by, among other changes, expanding the list of core courses that are exempt from the class-size limits.



CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Seven Constitutional Amendments passed this session that will be on the ballot in 2012:

Smart cap: If approved by voters, Senate Joint Resolution 958 will limit future growth in state revenues to a formula based on population growth and inflation. If the state collects money in excess of the cap, that money will go first to the budget stabilization fund and then to school property tax reductions. This cap includes state spending only and does not apply to local governments.

Property taxes: Would give first-time homebuyers a property-tax discount and lower the cap on the annual rise in assessments for non-homestead property from 10 percent to 5 percent.


Property taxes: Would expand a property-tax discount for veterans injured in combat.

Abortion: Bans the use of public dollars to pay for abortions


Faith-based groups: Repeals a Reconstruction-era constitutional amendment that bans using state dollars for religious purposes. Sponsor Sen. Thad Altman said it would allow the state to partner with successful church-affiliated social programs such as substance-abuse treatment.

Health care: Would ban mandated health care, an attempt to block President Obama's reforms.

Courts: Would require Senate confirmation of Supreme Court justices and give the Legislature greater power to review court rules.

TAX RELIEF

I believe keeping Florida a low-tax, low-cost state is vital to our state's prosperity. This session, the Legislature passed several pieces of legislation aimed at providing tax relief for Floridians.

Through a combination of tax-relief measures and appropriations, the Legislature shaped an Economic Development Package that provides \$126 million in economic development incentives. We also approved a 3-day, back-to-school sales tax holiday on clothing, shoes, and school supplies.

Additionally, Florida lawmakers passed legislation to provide corporate income tax relief to Florida's businesses. The measure we passed will actually

eliminate the corporate income tax for approximately 15,000 of Florida's small businesses.

Tax relief is not just about providing relief to families, seniors, and businesses - it is also about stimulating our economy. I believe we can speed up our economic recovery by keeping taxes and burdensome government regulations low, reducing state spending while maximizing the value of every tax dollar the state collects, and pursuing policies that encourage entrepreneurship and re-investment in our state.
