Town Manager D'Agostino explained that Bridges of Lake Park had proposed to host a gift giving initiative for its program participants. He explained that the event was scheduled to take place on December 14, 2016 at the Lake Shore Park Pavilion and that the waiver totaled \$350.00.

7. The South Florida Southern Rock Festival Event Organizers to Pay for the Damages to Lake Shore Park.

Town Manager D'Agostino explained the item (see exhibit "A"). He explained that Southern Promotions & Events held a two-day South Florida Southern Rock Festival on October 1-2, 2016. He explained that prior to the event; the Event Organizers paid the Town a refundable deposit of \$1,800.00 for potential damages to Lake Shore Park and \$400.00 for potential damages to the Indoor Pavilion. He explained that a site survey was performed after the event and it had been determined that the estimated total to repair the damages was \$2,749.64. He requested the permission of the Town Commission to bill the Event Organizers an additional \$549.64 for the damages to Lake Shore Park. Vice-Mayor Glas-Castro questioned the actual cost of the incurred damages. Public Works Director David Hunt explained that the figures reported were estimates that may increase after additional analysis.

Motion: Vice-Mayor Glas-Castro moved to approve staff to use the deposit for the damages to Lake Shore Park and to invoice the event organizer for additional cost for the damages and if the amount goes unpaid The South Florida Southern Rock Festival Event Organizers would be prohibited from having future events in the Town of Lake Park; Commissioner Flaherty seconded the motion.

8. Commercial Vehicles in Residential Districts

Town Manager D'Agostino explained the item (see exhibit "B"). He explained that the Town Code of Ordinances did not prohibit the parking of Commercial Vehicles or Trucks with Commercial Signage. He asked the Commission for guidance on the prohibition of Commercial Vehicles in Residential Districts. Commissioner Flaherty asked for clarification of Commercial Vehicles parked at residences after sunset. Community Development Director Nadia DiTommaso explained that the typical commercial boxed van without an affixed cargo area was not prohibited by ordinance, and that a commercial boxed van with an affixed cargo area was prohibited and classified under the commercial

vehicle definition. Vice-Mayor Glas-Castro questioned if trucks with work equipment were prohibited. Community Development Director DiTommaso answered that trucks with work equipment were not prohibited. Commissioner Lynch asked for clarification of School Buses and Postal Vehicles. Community Development Director DiTommaso explained that buses were defined in section 2 (see exhibit "B"). Community Development Director DiTommaso explained that certain types of passenger vehicles were prohibited per the definition. Commissioner O'Rourke requested clarification of the passenger vans pictured (see exhibit "C"). Vice-Mayor Glas-Castro questioned if a light passenger van similar in size and shape without windows was prohibited. Community Development Director DiTommaso explained that a passenger light van was defined as any motor vehicle having a generally rectangular bulk, which has a carrying capacity of one ton or less was not prohibited. Vice-Mayor Glas-Castro asked if the Code Officers were able to determine a commercial vehicles capacity. Mayor DuBois explained that the capacity of commercial vehicles were listed on the cab of the vehicle as a model designation. Community Development Director DiTommaso explained that due to the lack of language provided in the Town Code, Code Officers are unable to determine if fines for violations should be imposed. Commissioner Flaherty suggested that staff provide the Commission with recommended changes. Commissioner O'Rourke suggested that the changes include a review of the classification of commercial vehicles and consider imposing a fine for multiple vehicles. Town Manager D'Agostino asked if the Commission would permit the parking of one commercial vehicle per property. Community Development Director DiTommaso explained that the Town Code permits the parking of one commercial vehicle per property. She explained that the majority of complaints received by the Community Development Department were in reference to commercial vehicles with lettering and that staff had issues in the determination of what was enforceable due to the language provided in the Town Code. Mayor DuBois suggested that the Code Enforcement Officers provide recommendations to the Commission about their continuous issues as it relates to commercial vehicles.

9. Medical Marijuana/Cannabis Discussion

Town Manager D'Agostino explained the item (see exhibit "D"). Commissioner O'Rourke suggested that the Commission consider the distribution and manufacturers of Medical Marijuana as a revenue source for the Town of Lake Park. Mayor DuBois suggested that the Commission also consider consumption areas per regulation of zoning. Commissioner Lynch read the restrictions per the Florida Department of Health Office of Compassionate Use (see exhibit "D"). Town Manager D'Agostino explained that the State of Florida had approved six dispensing organizations; of the six organizations, three were authorized to manufacture and dispense statewide.

Town Attorney Baird suggested that the Commission began with dispensaries due to their potential impact to the Town; he explained that the State of Florida Legislature has not provided direction as of December 2016. Commissioner O'Rourke asked would the designated areas for dispensaries be limited to the C-4 Zoning District (see map exhibit "D"). Vice-Mayor Glas-Castro suggested that the Commission discuss dispensaries and address cultivation and production in the future. Town Attorney Baird suggested that the Town needed to consult with law enforcement to secure designated dispensary locations.

He explained that legislature was needed in order to continue with the implementation of Medical Marijuana Dispensaries in the Town of Lake Park.

10. Resolution No. 61-12-16 Authorizing Execution of Professional Engineering Services Contract with Craven Thompson & Associates, Inc. for Phases 2, 3, and 4 Related to Replacement of the Town's Stormwater Outfall Structures Adjacent to 541 Northlake Boulevard.

Town Manager D'Agostino explained that Craven Thompson & Associates (CTA) performed landslide and underwater surveys of the existing conditions associated with the replacement of the Town's stormwater outfall structures for preliminary review by the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD). He explained that a meeting was held at the SFWMD on August 24, 2016 and that District Staff approved a course of action for the remediation/replacement of the manhole structure, outfall pipe, and embankment restoration. Mayor DuBois asked if Firestone received a discharge permit from SFWMD for the twenty-one inch pipe that was installed. Public Works Director Hunt explained that Firestone did not receive a direct discharge and that Firestone flowed over the embankment. He explained that Firestone engaged a contractor to remediate the embankment and that a smaller outfall pipe was installed in lieu of the original. Mayor DuBois asked if a stormwater drain was installed. Public Works Director Hunt explained that the SFWMD has required Firestone to re-evaluate their site-plan. He explained that Firestone would benefit from the use of the Towns structure and therefore would be asked to become a part of the Towns Stormwater Utility.

Commissioner O'Rourke announced that the Town of Lake Park had a contractual agreement with Palm Beach County Fire Rescue. He explained that he had been advised that the exclusive services to the Town of Lake Park had not been maintained and ask Town Manager D'Agostino to investigate the issue.

Commissioner Flaherty thanked Town personnel for the Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony.

He announced that there would be a Welcome Reception open to the public for Principal Michelle Fleming on Thursday, January 19, 2016 from 6:00 p.m.-8:00 p.m. at the Town Hall Mirror Ballroom, 535 Park Avenue, Lake Park, FL 33403. He announced that the Chamber of Commerce Government Affairs Committee sought Municipal Legislative Agendas. He announced that he and Town Manager D'Agostino had received plaques of appreciation from Operation Hope. He announced that on December 6, 2016 the Palm Beach Gardens Rotary Club held a Ceremony in observance of Pearl Harbor. He announced that on Friday, December 9, 2016 the transmittal for the U.S. Highway 1 Mixed-Use Application would go before the Treasure Coast Regional Planning Council. He explained that it had received a recommendation for approval and would be listed on their Consent Agenda.

Summary Explanation/Background:

Southern Promotions & Events held a two-day South Florida Southern Rock Festival on October 1-2, 2016 at Lake Shore Park and Indoor Pavilion. Prior to the event, the organizers paid the Town a total refundable deposit of \$1,800.00 for potential damages to Lake Shore Park and \$400.00 for potential damages to the Indoor Pavilion. After the event, a site survey was performed by staff to assess the damages from the event and it has been determined that the estimated total amount to repair the damages is **\$2,749.64**. This amount includes material and

labor (Please see attached damage estimates form for breakdown). Staff has tried to contact Southern Promotions & Events on several occasions to discuss the damages and repairs. At this time, staff is asking the Town Commission to approve of staff asking Southern Promotions & Events to pay an additional \$549.64 to the Town, which will cover the total repair cost.

Summary Explanation/Background:

In a previous Town Commission meeting, the Vice-Mayor requested that the Code for commercial vehicles be revisited. In an effort to bring the discussion full circle and provide for Commission consensus on any code changes that are desired, this item is being brought forward <u>for discussion</u>.

The existing Town Code for commercial vehicles reads the following:

Sec. 30-35. - Parking of commercial vehicles.

(a) *Purpose and intent*. It is the intent of this section to preserve the character of the residence districts and to preserve the value of the residential property in the town by prohibiting the parking of commercial vehicles in all residence districts. All other town regulations in conflict with

the requirements of this section are hereby superseded to the extent that the most stringent shall apply.

(b) *Definitions*. As used in this section, the following words, terms and phrases, when used in this section, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this subsection, unless the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Bus means any motor vehicle, other than a taxicab, designated or used for the transportation of persons or compensation.

Commercial vehicle means:

- (1) Any agricultural, construction or industrial equipment;
- (2) Any bus, step van, truck or truck tractor; and/or
- (3) Any taxicab.

Light van means any motor vehicle having a generally rectangular bulk, which has a carrying capacity of one ton or less.

Pickup truck means any motor vehicle designed primarily for the transportation of property with a permanently attached open cargo or utility box not extending above the vehicle roofline and having a carrying capacity of one ton or less.

Step van means any motor vehicle having a generally rectangular bulk, designed and manufactured primarily as a commercial delivery or service truck, and characterized by having sufficient headroom for a person five feet in height to stand upright. The term "step van" shall include, but shall not be limited to, a light van to which an enlarged cargo area has been fitted.

Taxicab means any automobile used for the transportation of persons for hire.

Truck means any motor vehicle, other than a pickup truck or light van, which is designed primarily for the transportation of property or cargo.

Truck tractor means any motor vehicle, other than a pickup truck, which is designed for or equipped with a fifth wheel hitch for drawing semitrailers.

The above prohibition <u>excludes</u> light vans <u>without</u> cargo areas affixed (which is the equivalent of your typical box truck without any cargo area). It also excludes these light vans, regular cars/automobiles (not otherwise prohibited above), or pick-up trucks with commercial signage.


For example, a homeowner who works for an Air Conditioning company or a Landscaping company, driving either a light van (box truck) without a cargo area, or a regular car, or a pick-up truck with commercial signage on the vehicle, would be permitted to park in residential areas.

Quite some time ago, the Town Commission discussed the incorporation of medical marijuana/cannabis related uses in the Town Code. Given the recent passing of medical marijuana/cannabis in the State of Florida, it will be important for the Town to now move forward with the creation of land development regulations that would allow for the cultivation, dispensing, or both, of medical marijuana within the Town's jurisdictional boundaries, or impose a moratorium until which time the State develops its enabling regulations.

While some municipalities throughout Florida have enacted land development regulations (as early as several years ago), other municipalities and Counties (such has Boca Raton, Sarasota, Stuart, St. Lucie County and Hillsborough County, for example) have decided to place moratoriums on any marijuana/cannabis related uses until which time the State develops regulations for these uses. Since medical marijuana/cannabis recently got approved through the passage of Amendment 2 and in an effort to take a proactive approach since the use may be expanded in the future in the State if approved by an additional amendment, Staff has identified three possible uses for medical marijuana/cannabis and is proposing to create the following in the Town Code <u>for discussion purposes only this evening, in an effort to gage Commission consensus on how to best move forward:</u>

Marijuana/Cannabis Cultivation: Special exception use only in the CLIC zoning district (Zoning Map enclosed). Operation to be conducted inside a permanent building only.

Marijuana/Cannabis Dispensaries: Permitted in the C-4 zoning district (Zoning Map enclosed).

Any other marijuana/cannabis not otherwise listed above would be prohibited in the Town Code. Associated signage, parking, security, State of Florida facility registration confirmation, on-site consumption prohibitions and limited hours of operation are additional regulations that will be included in the proposed Ordinance and are up for discussion this evening as well.

Following tonight's discussion, staff will work with the Town Attorney to prepare a proposed Ordinance that will first be presented to the Planning & Zoning Board at their January 2017 meeting, followed by Town Commission first and second readings in February 2017.

Florida's Six Dispensing Organizations: Approved dispensing organizations are the only businesses allowed to grow or dispense cannabis in Florida. Florida law does not allow for home grow of low-THC or medical cannabis. Presently, three of the six dispensing organizations have received dispensing authorization and are authorized to dispense statewide.

Current physical dispensing locations are in Tallahassee and Clearwater, but dispensing organizations are authorized to deliver statewide. Aside from patients or their legal representatives, dispensing organization employees are the only individuals allowed to transport cannabis. Cannabis cannot be mailed.

The Compassionate Use Registry: The Department of Health's secure, electronic registration system for physicians, patients and legal representatives is available. There are no paper prescriptions for an authorized order of low-THC or medical cannabis.

Law Enforcement Users: For access to the registry, please submit a completed Request for Access to the Compassionate Use Registry Form to the Office of Compassionate Use, 4052 Bald Cypress Way, Tallahassee, FL 32399.

Restrictions for Use & Administration: Pursuant to section 381.986, F.S., patients are prohibited from smoking low-THC or medical cannabis. This means that patients will not have any whole flower as part of their qualified order. Patients cannot use or administer the product on any form of public transportation, in any public place, place of employment if restricted by his or her employer, state correctional institution, on the grounds of a preschool/primary school/secondary school, on a school bus or in a vehicle, aircraft or motorboat.
